Background on Old County of Santa Cruz Water Rights and Reservoir Designations

County Water Resources Staff are investigating and recommending updating some of the old legacy water rights and reservoir designations in the county.

In 1957, the first water supply master plan for Santa Cruz County was completed and adopted by the Board of Supervisors acting as the Board of Directors of the Santa Cruz County Flood Control District. This plan recommended the establishment of a water distribution system extending from the north coast to the Pajaro Valley which would be supplied by a series of large surface water reservoirs throughout the county. The plan also recommended that the County and State secure water rights necessary for the future construction of those reservoirs. On September 8, 1958, the Board adopted Resolution 591-58 requesting the State to reserve water rights on the affected streams until such time as the projects could be constructed. The State subsequently filed those appropriative water rights, which are still on the books:

A State Filed Application is held by the State Water Board, which may release from priority or assign any portion of the State Filed Application when "the release or

assignment is for the purpose of development not in conflict with such general or coordinated plan or with water quality objectives established pursuant to law." (Wat. Code, § 10504.) The State Water Board may not assign a State Filed Application if the county in which the water covered by the proposed application originates would be deprived of water necessary for its development (Wat. Code, § 10505). The State Water Board must hold a public hearing before making any release from priority or assignment of a State Filed Application, as required by Water Code section 10504.1. 2.

The Board of Supervisors recently took action to support release of the State-Filed Application A018334 to divert up to 21,000 acre-feet per year from the Pajaro River in favor of PV Water's College Lake Project. At this point, no other water storage projects utilizing the other State-File Applications are pending or envisioned.

<u>Question:</u> Should the County take steps to release the other state-filed applications, or could those applications somehow be converted to a water right that might help preserve existing instream flows or provide other benefits?

General Plan Designations

Related to the County Water Supply Master Plan, the County General plan also protected some of the reservoir sites that were proposed. In additional to the water supply watersheds currently used for water supply, the General Plan also designated as Water Supply Watershed the watershed areas upstream of the proposed sites:

- Glenwood Reservoir on the West Branch of Soquel Creek
- Upper Soquel Reservoir on the East Branch of Soquel Creek
- Pescadero Reservoir on Pescadero Creek, a tributary to the Pajaro River in south county


The General Plan also designates reservoir protection areas at each of those three sites and at College Lake:

Policy CO-1.6.13 Proposed Water Supply Reservoir Site Designation. Designate on the General Plan and LCP Land Use Plan Resources Maps the following areas as proposed water supply reservoir sites: Glenwood Reservoir on the west branch of Soquel Creek, Upper Soquel Reservoir on Soquel Creek, College Lake on Salsipuedes Creek and Pescadero Reservoir on Pescadero Creek.

Policy CO-1.6.14 Development Activities Within Proposed Reservoir Protection Areas. Prohibit development activities, including land divisions within reservoir protection areas, unless such activities promote reservoir protection or facilitate reservoir development. Allow one single-family dwelling unit per existing parcel of record within a reservoir protection area after providing the water supply agency proposing the reservoir with notice of the filing of the application and providing the agency with a reasonable opportunity to acquire the parcel. Reservoir protection areas consist of the proposed water supply reservoir sites and areas within 1,250 feet from the high water elevation of reservoirs, as shown on the General Plan and LCP Resources and Constraints maps. Water Supply Watershed Designations and Reservoir protection areas are both included in the County's Rural Development Density Determination (SCC Chapter 13.14). There are a number of other policies and programs that limit density and other activities within water supply watersheds.

Current General Plan Water Supply Watershed and Reservoir Designations:

Light Blue: Water Supply Watershed (Active) Purple: Water Supply Watershed (no longer proposed or active) Dark Blue: Reservoir Protection Areas.



As part of the current General Plan Update, staff is recommending that the provisions and designations regarding reservoir protection areas be deleted and that the watersheds of the reservoir sites no longer be designated as water supply watershed, unless they are currently being used for water supply by existing water systems, as is the case with the upper West Branch of Soquel Creek.
